BEGINNING DRAWING & PAINTING COURSE SYLLABUS

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About this course

This class is designed to introduce students to fine art and meets the fine art requirement for graduation and the "F" requirement for admission into the UC and CSU systems. It is intended to provide students with an understanding of visual design and a deeper appreciation of art and culture. Students will build a portfolio (a collection of an artist's best work) consisting of eight quality works of art. This portfolio is a requirement for Advanced Drawing and Painting and is encouraged for college entry.

Supplies

Note: The book keeper no longer accepts personal checks.

All supplies will be provided for the completion of this class however, additional supplies may be purchased to make the class more rewarding. Additional supplies that my be used in this class are: Kneaded Eraser, Pentel® Oil Pastel Set- 12 or more colors, set of 4 Drawing Pencils (HB - 6B), pencil Sharpener, 2-pocket folder with paper fasteners, a large glue stick, 12 Pk. Prismacolor® colored pencils, Ink and Quill set, and/or Elmer's white glue. Students are recommended to purchase these supplies as it better enables them to complete their assignments in a timely manner and provides additional opportunities to take work home should the student need to put additional time into their work.



Assignments

Assignments in this class fall into four categories: Projects, Sketchecks, tests/quiz, and homework. Projects are completed works of art. They focus on specific learning goals and are intended to introduce students to new media and ways of creating. "Sketchecks" in this class are checkpoints for students' sketchbooks: these are small collections of information used to complete projects. A typical unit of instruction includes a Sketcheck and a Project together which focus on a certain amount of new learning. Grading

Grades are earned by the student for their ability to express their learning at different intervals. Assignments labeled "Projects" make up about 50% of a student's overall grade, "Sketchecks" make up 25%, homework only about 5%, and Finals, 20%. School board policy cf. 6154 states that student non-performance in a class may result in the lowering of that student's grade.
